# strike, predict long fight

Members of Ohio's congressional delegation expressed support for Sunday's military strikes but warned that Sunday was just the first day of what is likely to be a long battle.

"The president deserves credit," said U.S. Rep. Ralph Regula, R-Bethlehem Township. "He didn't just plunge into it; this is a very orderly program. ... The decision to include a food drop as part of this is a good stroke."

"This will be a long, protracted struggle," said Sen. Mike DeWine, R-Ohio.

Rep. Tom Sawyer, a Democrat from Akron, said the U.S. attacks represent "a day that had to come."

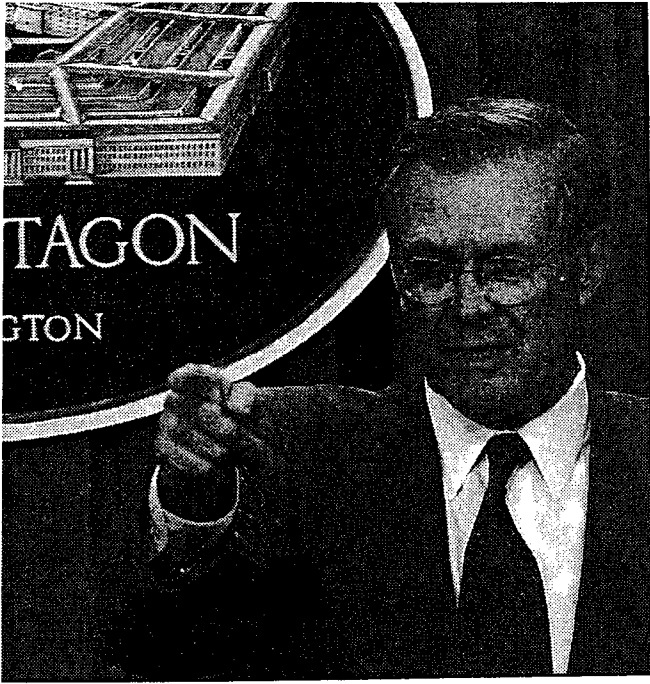
"If the Taliban wasn't going to

respond to the requests made of them, this was going to happen eventually. This is the first day of what is going to be a very long struggle."

Sawyer met with Sikhs after meeting with U.S. reservists Sunday.

"The message that everyone says is that we're all in this together. We want to see this done as well as it can be done with the harm to the fewest number of innocents. We've already lost 7,000 innocents."

Regula said that terrorism is the overriding issue at a NATO parliamentary conference he attended this weekend in Ottawa, Canada, and that representatives from 40 countries there expressed strong support for the U.S. position.

Vice President Dick Cheney and Secretary of State Colin Powell called foreign leaders as the administration continued to press its campaign to hold together an international coalition now that the military response has begun. Powell will visit Pakistan and India later this week.

Bush alerted congressional leaders Saturday night that he had given the order to the Pen- tagon to launch the strikes.

Hastert was pulled out of memorial service in Wheaton, Ill., for Todd Beamer, who was killed in the crash of the hijacked plane that went down in Pennsylvania. Gephardt was at Oriole Park at Camden Yards for Cal Ripken's last game as a Baltimore Oriole. Bush urged him to continue with a planned trip to New York with Hastert on Sunday to meet with busi- ness executives.

Bush returned to the White House on Sunday morning after spending the weekend at Camp David and attending a memorial service for firefighters. In his radio address on Saturday he had warned the Taliban that "time is running out." That decla- ration came after a final round of diplomatic and military prepara- tion, including a Rumsfeld trip to

The children have seen news stories of the planned war against terrorists on television at school every morning since the Sept. 11 attacks. Since the family learned Adams would likely be called up, it has been tough on Nichole, her mother said.

"The (school) counselor called and I told her that Nichole and I are very close, and it might be best if I handle it, with their help," she said. "They allow Nichole to use the phone to call me, and I can talk her through it. It's been a big help."

Stephanie has a surprise wait- ing in her father's shaving kit. Sometimes, when he goes away, the family puts a note in the kit. This time, Stephanie crawled under a light-stand table and wrote the letter herself.

Matt believes his father is doing the right thing.
