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1 Thursday Morning Session, 2 May 2, 2002. 3 4 **PROCEEDINGS** 5 6 7 Snyder vs. Concerned CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Citizens for the Fair Treatment of Stray Animals. 8 we conduct hearings around here is we first have an 9 opening statement by each party. Opening statement is a 10 brief statement. Then you call witnesses. 11 12 complainant goes first and the respondent goes second. What I'd like to do now is -- are you an 13 14 attorney, Mr. Snyder? 15 MR. SNYDER: No, sir, I'm not. 16 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Okay. I'd like the 17 clerk -- the reporter to swear anybody that's going to testify in the case of Snyder versus Concerned Citizens. 18 If you'd all stand, those that are going to testify, that 19 includes Mr. Snyder. Just stand and raise your right 20 21 hand, and the court reporter will issue the cath. 22 (Thereupon all witnesses were sworn in 23 by the court reporter.) CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: A little unsolicited 24 25 advice, and that is to -- we used to have a TV show, it

was called Dragnet. And the guy used to say: "Just the facts." So you can do your rhetoric in closing.

MR. SNYDER: Mr. Chairman, I appreciate it. As the chair so noted, you have the copies of the flyers that were circulated in the last election, November of 2001.

It is my contention, and I think the testimony as well as the evidence of the minutes of the council meetings -- council meetings of the whole will show that there was no money ever expended of the City of North Canton.

The City of North Canton has a firm policy, it does not trap or detain or maintain any domestic animals, be it cat or dog.

The case in fact was simply a moral claim presented by a constituent of mine to become whole for what she expended to a professional trapper for nuisance animals. However, in that flyer it does say that I authorized, as the charter of the City of North Canton will hold out, I do have a copy, that no council person by himself or herself, is authorized to spend any money.

It takes four affirmative votes of the council, to which it was not done. It was 5 to 2. There was no money spent, but in that flyer I think you will denote that it does say that Mr. Sarbach and myself

authorized the expenditures of funds, as well as the flyer itself shows no committee, except the committee chairman, who did not sign a designation of treasure, who did not authorize her name to be placed upon that flyer. It was fraudulently applied to that flyer.

So there's two violations. And I feel that this particular time it was willfully disseminated and passed out solely to defeat me in the election for -- my re-election to council.

Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Who's going to be the spokesperson to do the opening statement for the respondent? You don't have to. If you don't want to, you don't have to do it. Okay. Just give us a brief statement of your defense.

MS. KAVANAUGH: My name is Kimberly Joy Kavanaugh, and I am with, supposedly, Concerned Citizens for the Fair Treatment of Stray Animals. And I just planned to show to you that our help was solicited by Kathy Magle and Bill Smith.

All we did was a walk-about with the flyers. We did not see the flyers until the day we started passing them out. They printed the flyers. They also gave us the name of Concerned Citizens because they wanted to have it put under my group.

1 We were incorporated, which was, you know, they couldn't put it under at that time. It's illegal to 2 do that. Bill Smith was the one that sent me down to the Board of Elections because I have had no political involvement at all up to that point. 5 And when they asked for a treasurer to sign, we had discussed about my sister doing it, and they wanted 7 a signature at that time. So I put my signature down. 8 9 And I had told Bill Smith prior to the distribution of the flyers that my sister was not on it, 10 11 it was me. And apparently he did not hear it or the flyers were already put out, and a disclaimer was put down 12 13 as my sister, Barb Walter. That's all I have right now. 14 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: My question to you is 15 you subpoenaed William Smith and you subpoenaed Kathlene Magle. We got a letter from Kathlene Magle. She said she 16 can't make it because of her disability. Is William Smith 17 18 here on your behalf? 19 MS. KAVANAUGH: Yes, he is. 20 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Thank you. 21 sit down. Go ahead, Mr. Snyder, call your first witness. 22 MR. SNYDER: The only other witness I have 23 is Mr. Sarbach, who actually wanted to make a statement. 24 And if I may ask him to defer to the closing --25 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: We want evidence here.

SNYDER: Yes, sir, she does. 7 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Thank you. 8 MR. SNYDER: You're welcome. Pursuant to 9 that, it was defeated. There was no money spent. legislation died for the fact that there were not four 10 11 affirmative votes to spend it. 12 At that particular time Mrs. Magle, who is the 13 chairperson of the committee that would originally generate the legislation, that being ordinances and rules, 14 15 took it upon herself to re-introduce the moral claim. 16 At that time, as the president of council, I have the right to either elect or decide not to allow it 17 to appear upon the agenda. And I asked Chairman Magle at 18 the time: What is the reason that we would reconsider 19 20 It was defeated by a vote of five to two. For what particular reason would you bring this up other than to 21 22 embarrass me? 23 I said this unofficially to her. She said it's a matter of public safety. She -- at that time I 24 25 said to the clerk of the council, fine. I allowed the

chairperson to put it back on the agenda and see what happens.

Again, it was put back on the agenda. It did not come out of the committee that she chaired. It was voted two to one not to reconsider it. During that meeting, again, the three members here of the committee, Mr. Smith, Mrs. Magle, were in attendance. They realized it was reiterated, and the minutes will so state the city does not pay or reimburse for trapping of tame domestic animals.

It was simply a consideration of a constituent who had spent money. It had nothing to do with the trapping of animals. However, as you can see, that particular statement was sent around to the members of my ward and the members of Mr. Sarbach's ward, who was seeking re-election in Ward 2, and consequently was defeated, which he feels was based upon that, because it was such a sharp margin.

CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Take a look at your flyer, the flyer attached to your complaint. Who are the two members -- you said it was defeated 5 to 2?

MR. SNYDER: That's correct.

CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Who are the two members that voted for the measure?

MR. SNYDER: Mr. Sarbach and myself.

1 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Thank you. Do you 2 have anything else to say? 3 MR. SNYDER: Other than the fact that the 4 flyer, again, as I said in my opening remarks, the flyer 5 does not contain the right designation of treasurer. have a copy of the original on file with the Stark County 6 7 Board of Elections. 8 It does not show the lady's name. It does show, as well as the statement where Mr. Smith paid for 9 10 the flyers, Mrs. Magle typed and copied the flyers. you like that introduced as evidence, sir? 11 12 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Mr. Richter, please get that piece of evidence. Pass it around to the 13 14 Commission members. 15 MR. SNYDER: One thing -- the reason that this was considered to be a moral claim, it was the 16 opinion of the Law Director of the City of North Canton, 17 whom I consulted. The property of the particular 18 19 constituent of mine seeking a moral claim, abuts a 20 property at 555 Church Street Southwest, City of North 21 Canton. 22 The property is presently in litigation by the 23 City to have the property raised. It has been abandoned 24 in excess of 18 months. 25 Its habitat is overgrown. There's many

SNYDER: It was conjecture, sir, that there was 13 cats trapped. And the defense of the people 5 6 that represent that committee, they do a very good service for the community to protect domestic animals. They were 7 8 brought in under the assumption that the City was 9 collecting cats. 10 As a City they trapped cats in the past, but they released them. We do not authorize the trapping. 11 12 That's how somewhere along the line, through Mrs. Mohler's 13 direct testimony, I believe in the council, she said over 14 a period of a couple months there had been possibly 13 15 cats trapped. 16 She believed them to be ferrel in nature 17 because 555 Church, it's a natural habitat for -- I'm not familiar with the workings of a ferrel cat, how they live. 18 They're just really not people-type cats. 19 20 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Any other questions by any other members of the Commission? 21 22 COMMISSIONER BOOTH: Your five to two vote 23 was regarding the skunks and the possums, not the cats? 24 MR. SNYDER: Yes, sir. Our five to two 25 vote was to pay a constituent a moral claim.

1 That went down by a vote of five to two. Α Ιt was defeated with yourself and myself voting in the 2 3 positive. 4 Was it your understanding as a member of the 0 full council body that that was only a consideration of a 5 6 moral claim, not the trapping of any animals? 7 That is correct. Due to the policy of the Α 8 City, we would not do that, sir. 9 As well as it was reiterated by the chair and three members of the council that the City does not permit 10 11 the trapping of domestic cats? 12 That policy was reiterated at several meetings Α and in several personal conversations with the individuals 13 14 involved. And I might add one thing, that this animal 15 group does a great service to our county and our 16 community, and I believe they were duped and a pawn in 17 this issue for political matter. But again, to the best of your independent 18 recollection, sir, was any members of that committee or 19 Mr. Smith or Mrs. Magle in attendance at both of those 20 21 meetings? 22 Α My recollection is they were all present at 23 this meeting in September. 24 Sir, do you have knowledge of the fact that in 0 the last Charter Review Commission Mrs. Magle was a member 25

of the Charter Review Commission?

A That is correct, because I was a council representative to the Charter Review Commission, and I sat in on a review that Mrs. Magle was a chair person -- or a commissioner on.

Q So it would be, again, your opinion, sir, that Mrs. Magle would be aware of the charter that requires four affirmative votes of council to pay a bill, whether it be for trapping or for reimbursement of moral claim, and that's the only way any money could be spent?

A It's my opinion Ms. Magle was fully aware of how the charter works, and she did a very good job of reviewing that commission. As provided for by the charter, that needs to be reviewed every 10 years. She did a very good job. She was very knowledgable of all aspects of that charter at that time.

Q As well, to the best of your independent recollection, over the last three and a half years,
Mr. William Smith has attended most council meetings of the whole, and council meetings, sir?

A It's my recollection, I've seen him there quite often at the beginning of meetings. I have never seen him there at the end of meetings, or I can't recall seeing him there at the end of meetings. I know he's there at most commencements of meetings.

Q Again, sir, it would be your opinion attending these several council meetings that Mr. Smith would be aware of the fact that the charter requires four affirmative votes to expend any money?

A I would think. I don't see how he couldn't

A I would think. I don't see how he couldn't understand that if he was there at all at the meetings he attended.

Q As well as Mr. Smith, I believe was a candidate for office for the City of North Canton on two different occasions?

A That's correct. The last two elections, 2001 and 1999 he was a candidate for, I believe in '99 he was my opponent in Ward 2, and in 2001 he ran for council of the whole, and he was defeated in both elections.

Q Again, relying on your independent recollection, the people of the Committee for the Fair Treatment of Cruelty to Animals, here in attendance today, were all in attendance at those meetings and were fully aware of the fact from the chair, myself and from yourself and a couple other council people as well as the assistant director, Mr. Treden, who was in attendance at the meeting.

He said: This is simply a moral claim. The City does not trap animals except through their own licensed contract hire; is that correct?

MS. KAVANAUGH: My name is Kimberly Joy
Kavanaugh. I am with a rescue group. I've been a rescuer
for over 30 years. When we were told there was a chain of
events, Kathy Magle and Bill Smith were the ones that
sought us out when this came to be.

We had no recollection. We never saw the flyers until the day we passed them out. I questioned Bill Smith and Kathy Magle at the time of distribution. I said: Can you say this? And quote and unquote, they said it came word for word verbatim out of the minutes.

All right. When charges came down that there was violation in the procedures, I contacted Bill Smith. He provided me with the minutes of the meeting. I went through it several times, and I could not find the statement.

I looked it up in a Webster's Dictionary.

"Authorization" means giving your vote, which he did the very first time. So I thought, well, we're still in the clear, but at no time did we seek to hurt anybody.

We had heard through rumors, and I talked to the mayor, who's here today, too, that there was possibly a program that could be started in North Canton, which would have been a very innovative program to help rescue animals, that the City would help sponsor those animals,

And you said that the cats were let loose and 16 then they were drowned and they were rabid. This was all 17 brought out at the meeting. 18 19 But I didn't say they were drowned or rabid, 20 did I? 21 There was jousting between you, Magle and all Α the other Board members. I know that came out during that 22 23 meeting, and I said if they were rabid, were the heads sent to Columbus, because that's a state law. 24

I have no particular axe to grind with Mrs. Kavanaugh or her sister, Mrs. Farnsworth. They serve a very valuable purpose in the makeup and the protection of wild animals that do not have homes. However, they were duped, but unfortunately, I'll be 56 years old in a couple weeks, so I do check before I do things.

Sir, you're a lawyer. You know that you don't ever sign or associate with anything without talking to your counsel or somebody that knows.

Mr. Smith's intention, Mrs. Magle's intention was to willfully unseat me. The law is very clear. It states that anyone, and I can't quote verbatim, but anybody who willfully disseminates, passes or circulates information to be a falsehood should be fined and punished or imprisoned or both or some type of sanction greater than a slap on the arm.

If people are to continue to run for office and public office, they should not have a fear of being maligned or talked about when it's a flagrant lie.

Mr. Sarbach feels he lost the election predicated on that.

I don't know, maybe, maybe not. However, I want my name 1 2 redeemed. 3 I want some type of satisfaction. It should be a public apology or something. 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COMMISSIONER SULLIVAN: To get something on the table, Mr. Chairman, I move that we issue a public reprimand against this group. If I could just make a statement as to why.

I understand that these people say they have been duped, but people have to understand when they're in the political arena that it's important to do your due diligence and look carefully at the statements that are being used to support your issue.

And many times we found here that ignorance is not a defense, particularly when the outcome of an election is at stake. And I'm afraid that too many groups, like animal activists and animal rights groups, get very bad names because of situations like that.

They don't operate on fact. They operate on rumors and wild statements without doing any research.

And I don't think that's fair to the voters. And at the same time I don't think it's fair to the candidates, and they're not doing them any service by not doing their homework.

Just because they were animal people doesn't mean their standard is any less in doing their homework and doing their due diligence. I do feel very badly for them. They're not politicians, but they entered the political arena. And once you enter the political arena

you have to operate by the rules of the system. 1 2 And I think this is an important case where we tell people that if you enter the political arena and you 3 don't do your homework and you don't operate under the 4 rules of due diligence, you are subject to a public 5 reprimand at the least for making false statements in a 6 7 situation like this. And that's the reason that I'm making the 8 9 motion that I am. 10 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: We shouldn't have discussion until we have a second. 11 12 COMMISSIONER SULLIVAN: Sorry. 13 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Do we have a second? 14 COMMISSIONER TYLER: Second. 15 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Any discussion? I do 16 Take a look at the respondent, it says: have a question. "Response of Concerned Citizens for Fair Treatment of 17 Stray Animals, Barbara Walter, Treasurer." 18 If this passes, who do you want the public reprimand issued to? 19 20 COMMISSIONER SULLIVAN: Well, the 21 committee. I don't think that we're making a determination against Barbara Walter, Treasurer, 22 personally. And maybe Mr. Richter needs to help us on 23 this issue, but I think it goes to the committee. 24 not found a determination against Ms. Walter personally 25

1 here. 2 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: I just wanted to clear 3 that up. 4 COMMISSIONER SULLIVAN: Actually I guess we need a clarification on this because she's really not 5 the treasurer. The treasurer is Kavanaugh. So we need to 6 make sure that the public reprimand is going to the proper treasurer on behalf of that group, which would be 8 9 Kavanaugh. Is that right? 10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RICHTER: Yeah. think, I would assume that the -- obviously the reason why 11 Barbara Walter was listed as the treasurer for the 12 committee is that that was what was on the literature. 13 14 If that person is not acting as the treasurer, I think it would be appropriate for this Commission to 15 disseminate whatever materials it has to the proper 16 17 treasurer for the committee. 18 That being the case as established here by the 19 evidence, that is who it would be sent to. 20 CHAIRMAN CINCIONE: Mr. West. 21 COMMISSIONER WEST: The reason I would refer it to the prosecutor is that he can sort some of 22 these issues out as well as conduct an investigation of 23 Magle and Smith, who seem to be the real culprits here, 24 25 and let the prosecutor do that.

COMMISSIONER SHEERER: Mr. Chairman, I certainly would not support any effort to send this to a prosecutor. And I'm having some trouble with the idea of even offering a public reprimand, but I don't disagree one iota about a group that participates in an effort that will affect the outcome of an election has a stronger duty than what we saw evidenced today.

enhanced by a public reprimand back in the community, but will be enhanced by these people going back to their community and talking about the fact that: Hey, next time we get involved in anything like this, and it is very legitimate to want to be involved in political activity, and I encourage involvement in political activity, but when you do it, because what you do is being represented to the public as a piece of information about the election, you got to be darn sure of what it is you're turning out or handing out or lending your name to.

That's a tough lesson, but I think the lesson has been learned, and I would believe that amongst your community members, your group members, that the word will be passed around, what is the appropriate way for us to be involved?

I have a little trouble with a public reprimand. I'd be interested in having good cause, for

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good cause, and not go any further with it.
